"Not that I am referring to being in need; for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me."

Philippians 4:11-13

Through the ups and downs of life, I have learned many wise lessons. The most important lesson I have learned is not a modern scholarly discovery. The most important lesson in my life is that I can trust God with all my problems. No matter what I am going through, God is with me and loves me. Even through the darkest nights, I have had deep joy and a hope that only God's presence could give.

You can feel this assurance too. You can trust God. You can relax and enjoy your life even when the times we are living in are scary. All it takes is faith.

This wisdom lesson is simple, but not easy to realize. We often get distracted by the world. Through the ups and downs of worldly life, sometimes we get scared. Sometimes, it is hard to wait. Whether it's the night before Christmas, or the day before surgery, sometimes our emotions make it hard to just trust God. We worry. But there is hope for those who have given their hearts to Jesus.

The Apostle Paul wrote the Letter to the Philippians from a Roman prison. He had reason to worry, but because of his faith he didn't. And he was able to write with courage and strength even when in prison. He not only kept the faith, he used his misfortune to give hope to others. Paul trusted God. His life was truly an expression of Christ's love toward all. He traveled to many places, and did many things. Even though he started with the mind of a conservative Jewish Pharisee, he allowed God's Holy Spirit to change him and mold him into a more loving and accepting Christian.

Paul was born again. He went from stoning and persecuting Christians to converting Gentiles to Christ. Paul truly had a spiritual awakening.

PASTOR'S MESSAGE (Cont'd)

He changed completely. His heart opened wide to be able to include everyone into the fold of the Good Shepherd. Throughout his life, through mostly bad experiences, Paul learned to lean on Jesus.

He trusted God with all his problems. And you can, too. You can let go of worry and simply trust God. You can change into a person who is full of joy, and leads others to that joy. In our reading Paul says,

"I can do all things through him who strengthens me."

No matter how difficult the times are, even if we are going through a pandemic, even if we are being manipulated from every side and don't know what the truth is any more, even then, we can turn to God. We can be strong in Jesus Christ. When everything seems on the verge of change, we can place our hope in the hands of a benevolent and omnipotent God. With Paul's words, "(We) can do all things through him who strengthens (us)."

This is why I have hope for Shiloh UCC's future. Here at Shiloh, we trust God. We could complain that not everyone feels comfortable coming back to church yet, or we can rejoice that we have so many brave people in our pews who put God before everything else. Many of you come and worship every Sunday, regardless of what the TV says. God sees your courage, and I'm grateful for every single one of you.

I want you to know that I am grateful for you who have come back to worship in person, and I am grateful for you who watch us at home on your computer screen. I am grateful for every single member at Shiloh UCC. We will do great things together. We have already started an exciting visioning process. Everyone has an ongoing invitation to join us and dream together. If you feel inspired, share with the amazing people who belong to our Vision Team. Come and bend our ears a little with your hope for the future.

Believe it or not, we have a Confirmation Class, too. It's not huge, but they are great kids, coming from faithful, good families. I am so grateful for them. Thank you for sending your children and grandchildren to learn more about the Bible, God, and faith! Thank you for inspiring them to confirm their baptism by becoming faithful Christians.

I know, together we will build back this wonderful congregation. Together we can inspire our children and grandchildren to come back and be a part of this loving spiritual community.

PASTOR'S MESSAGE (Cont'd)

Inspired by Paul's words, "We can do all things through Jesus Christ who strengthens us." We can be a light in this dark world. We can spread hope, instead of bad news. We can lift people up, instead of tearing them down.

As the darkness grows around us, and nature gets ready to take a short nap, let's remember to light up the world with Christ's message. Let's tell everyone that they are God's beloved children and that in Jesus Christ they can have a new, hope filled life. Open your hearts wider, forgive those that need to be forgiven, and walk in God's strength. If you haven't been back to Shiloh UCC for a while, come back and check us out. You can even sleep in, have breakfast, and get here by the 11AM service.

I am so hopeful about our future together. Shiloh UCC has persisted through joy filled and difficult times. God has been taking care of this wonderful congregation through thick and thin. Nothing has changed. God is still here. Together we will build this temple back up to its former glory, and who knows, with God's help, maybe we will do something new. Together, let's trust God and continue to keep the faith.

Pastor's Report -

- Attended Troop 94 Monthly Troop meeting (Boy Scouts) on September 28.

OCTOBER CONSISTORY HIGHLIGHTS (Cont'd)

New business –

- A. In order to comply with Pastor Melinda's "Call" to Shiloh UCC, which states Pastor Melinda should have two days off a week, she will take off Tuesday instead of Monday the weeks of Consistory meetings, in order to provide her with a full day off.
- B. November 14 is the York Association Annual Meeting in our sanctuary, beginning at 1:30 p.m., with registration starting at 1:00 p.m., in the Welcome Center. Attendees will meet in person as well as using Zoom. (We will use the Zoom license from the Association.)
- C. Safety An evacuation plan for the sanctuary will be scheduled in the spring.
- D. Street signs that include the new service times will be ordered.
- E. In response to the Shepherding Committee's question regarding plates, bowls, cups, etc. that are currently in the kitchen cupboards but not used, it was suggested that they be boxed up and exchanged with the location of the paper plates, etc.
- F. Thanksgiving Service will be held the Sunday before Thanksgiving, at which time Thanksgiving envelopes may be used, in addition to regular Sunday collection envelopes. The Thanksgiving offering will be split between the Dover Food Bank and the Salvation Army.
- G. Cash Rally will be held Sunday, November 7. The cash rally funds will go towards the kitchen fund for upgrades.

Unfinished Business -

- A. Maira is contacting ushers using the schedule on the Team sheets created for 2021 and alerting Greeters that they will be positioned in the Welcome Center.
 - A survey has been created highlighting the immediate need for ushers, greeters, nursery attendants, and acolytes for both services, plus soup kitchen helpers. It was noted that there are only three people signed up for the nursery for the 11:00 service time. More are needed. Worship Service Nursery helpers must have child clearances, but Maira is able to help expedite that process. The survey will be included in the bulletin, sent out to all members in an email and also included in the Communique.
 - A special meeting will be held to update wedding costs.
 - It was decided that visitation dates included in the Pastor's report should cover the previous month only.
 - STSG will be putting finishing touches on the digital sign on Sept 13.
- B. Reduced restrictions will remain the same for the foreseeable future.
 - Communion keep the same
 - Outside doors will be kept locked.
 - Offering keep the same

OCTOBER CONSISTORY HIGHLIGHTS (Cont'd)

Church and Ministry -

- O All church staff reviews and individual staff meetings were completed by Janene Beck and Reen Bentzel. It was decided that Allison is also a staff member, therefore an evaluation document will be created prior to next August, when staff reviews are held, for her evaluation. A determination will be made as to teacher reviews.
- Consistory Elders met with Pastor Melinda on September 30, 2021 to discuss her "Raise Request". Staff raise increases take place in January of each year.
- Oconsistory and other church member Committee Chairs are asked to plan their next meeting at the conclusion of their current meeting and list it in the Consistory Agendas. Avoiding Monday meetings is expected and all Chairs should be reminded to keep minutes of the meetings including: topics discussed, attendees present, and start/end times. Keeping meetings to one hour or less is recommended. Also, it is necessary to notify the office of all planned meetings.
- Reen and Janene attended the September 28, 2021 monthly staff meeting. Four Shiloh UCC staff attended and it lasted 68 minutes. The next one is scheduled for Tuesday, October 26 at 10 am in Room 202.

Worship & Music -

- October 17 Nora Foust, Associate Conference Minister for Ministerial and Congregational Excellence will be preaching.
- Memorial Sunday, October 31 members will be invited to provide pictures of deceased family members to create a display.
- O Poinsettia sale will begin November 14 and end December 5.
- O Christmas Concert will be held December 5 at 6:00 PM followed by refreshments in room 100.

<u>Church Life</u> – The Harvest Home food collection collected 17 boxes of food for the Salvation Army.

Outreach/Evangelism -

- Contact will be made with all members announcing events and services during the Advent/Christmas season, possibly with postcards.
- O Current member outreach Shiloh UCC cups have been handed out
- Guest outreach bags have been placed in Welcome Center and are ready to be handed out.
- SOS meetings have been held for three Sundays. Discussions were informational and summary meeting will be held on October 17, during the Sunday School hour.

<u>Pastoral Care and Visitation</u> – Visitation happening via the phone and in person.

<u>Christian Ed</u> – Sallie reported Sunday school has been in session for 3 weeks, with one student, using the 18-week Lego curriculum.

OCTOBER CONSISTORY HIGHLIGHTS (Cont'd)

Youth Ministry -

- Crop Walk was held Sunday, Oct 10, at 2 pm in Sunset Park—money should be submitted to Nate by December 1.
- Trunk or Treat Sunday will be October 24th from 2 pm to 3 pm with individually wrapped candies and games. The congregation is invited to decorate their cars and hand out candy to the children as well. The Youth Ministry would love to see a large turnout from the congregation.
- There may be a carol sing.

ELC -

- ELC Advisory Meeting was on Monday, October 4, 2021, with 14 Advisory members in attendance. It lasted one hour and 11 minutes.
- Allison stated that this CoVid year is more difficult to navigate than last year. 4 students were out for a period of time due to having contact with someone with CoVid. No ELC student has had CoVid to Allison's knowledge. A few students are wearing shields instead of masks and one ELC teacher has her students wearing shields instead of masks due to her hearing impairment.
- Field trip masks will be used if they are indoors.
- Three kinds of Enrichment classes are offered and are well attended.
- ELC staff and students are looking forward to October 24th, 2 to 3 pm "Trunk or Treat".
- Duck Donut fundraiser pickup was October 9. A second fundraiser, R and K Sub and Pretzel Sandwich Sale will happen in November and the proceeds will go toward the ELC operational budget. Orders are due November 9 and pick-up is November 17 in Room 100. Church members are welcome to participate in fundraisers. Spring fundraiser will be simply "send a donation" for those who are able.
- Registration for 2022-2023 will happen November through January.
 Families will have opportunities to visit classrooms. Our church will provide some light refreshments. This can be a great "Outreach" time.
- The Tuition Committee will be Natalie Fuhrman, Allison Hartnett, and two parents. They will begin looking at the budget for 2022-2023 soon.
- Upcoming Events include: Fire Safety, Spirit Day, Chapel Time with Pastor Melinda, Vision Screenings, October Fall Party and Parade.
- Next meeting is on Thursday, November 4, 2021 at 5 pm in Room 202.
- Reen will invite Allison Hartnett to the November Consistory Meeting.

Finance Committee and Budget -

- Treasurer's Report Natalie paid the final bill for the digital sign of \$8,750, taken from the charitable trust.
- \$16,128.50 was collected in the month of September.
- September expenses were \$19,049.

Communication and Technology -

- Needs:
 - Pastor's monitor
 - Digital screens
 - Smart TV (65")
 - ELC laptop is set up and waiting for Allyson to clean up her files so they can be moved.
- O Tech Soup (discounted access for software for non-profits) will no longer sell perpetual licenses for MS Office but will have non-profits purchase Office 365. This starts in April.
- o Following a Jane Harrison/Steve Sechriest motion, Consistory approved purchasing the \$143 license for on-line streaming, which allows for the use of prerecorded music also.
- Online giving is in the testing phase. The rollout is still needed. This new donation site will be an opportunity for on-line viewers who are not members of the congregation to contribute to Shiloh UCC. It is noted that the ACH and envelope opportunities for members will also remain in place as the preferred methods of contribution for members of Shiloh UCC.

Stewardship -

• The Stewardship Committee met on Tuesday, Sept. 21st and recommends that the Christmas special offering be used to make improvements to the Kitchen and the All-Purpose Social Hall (room 100). It is recommended that the Lenten special offering go to the Shiloh Fire Company. The Committee plans to meet next on Tuesday, Jan. 18th at 6:00 PM. As previously addressed, the Thanksgiving offering will be split between the Dover Food Bank and the Salvation Army.

Property Committee –

- Sanctuary roof spouting drains on west side of building have been reconfigured to discharge above ground to eliminate water accumulating in Room 100 during heavy rains. Thanks to Ken Goodyear and John Reiber for their help with the project.
- O Jeff also noted that he met with the janitorial service to extend the 90-day trial period for one more 30-day trial period. Jeff said they are doing an ok job, but he went over a few situations that could be better and the service was open to his request.

MISSIONARY NEWS

Greetings to all our friends and family during this time of Thanksgiving and Harvest. So much has happened over the past few months, I would like to highlight two. First, through the help of Hearts and Hands for Jesus five young ladies from our church, Pastor Siany, and I were able to participate in the virtual Remnant Conference 2021 "Dwell." Our main scripture text was Hebrews 4:16 "Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." Throughout the pandemic and lock down learning to be still and entering into the throne room was what helped me to get through. I was forced because of circumstances to slow down. It brought me into a deeper relationship with the Lord and believing even more that Jesus is Better and He is Good. I dwelled in the Goodness of God. Two of the girls expressed how they learned the importance of taking time in their schedule to dwell in the presence of the Lord, and that Jesus is our High Priest. Another exciting highlight of October was our Fall Festivals and costume parades. Although they looked a little different, the students had fun and the parents were able to participate by watching our parade outside.


